Executive Summary

Membership: 9 faculty and 10 graduate students actively contributed to this year-end summary. 5 additional faculty and staff and 8 additional graduate students are presumed members of the area and listed below. The presumed total membership of the health area is therefore about 32. Most of those who contributed reports listed at least one additional focus area affiliation, including Research Methods (N = 11), Multicultural (N = 2), and Child/Family (N = 1). More than a dozen faculty from other departments are loosely affiliated with the area.

Highlights

Awards: 5 faculty (Harlow, Prochaska, Redding, Rossi, Velicer) and 4 students (Amoyal, Blaney, Fernandez, Larson) received a total of 16 awards.

Grants: 10 faculty reported a total of 24 grants, including 5 new awards (Harlow, Stein), 14 continuing awards (Harlow, Laforge, Prochaska, Redding, Rossi, Stein, Stevenson, Velicer, Wood), and 5 submitted proposals (Paiva, Stein, Wood).

Publications: Health area faculty and students reported a total of 60 publications, including 13 faculty and staff (Harlow, Laforge, Meier, Morokoff, Paiva, Prochaska, Redding, Robbins, Rossi, Stein, Stevenson, Velicer, Wood) and 8 students (Amoyal, Blaney, Burditt, Fernandez,

Gökbayrak, Gorraiz, Harrington, Zearley). Graduate students played significant authorship roles: 13 papers included graduate students as primary authors (22%) and 27 included graduate students in any authorship role (45%). There were 46 student authorships.

Presentations: Health area faculty and students reported a total of 39 presentations, including 11 faculty (Harlow, Meier, Paiva, Prochaska, Redding, Robbins, Rossi, Stein, Stevenson, Velicer, Wood) and 9 students (Amoyal, Blaney, Burditt, Fernandez, Gökbayrak, Kobayashi, Larson, Lipschitz, Martin, Yin). In addition, 4 students (Amoyal, Blaney, Gökbayrak, Yin) attended conferences, workshops, and colloquia. Graduate students again played significant authorship roles: 18 presentations included graduate students as primary authors (47%) and 22 in any authorship role (58%). There were 55 student authorships.

Courses: 4 faculty (Harlow, Paiva, Rossi, Stein) reported teaching health related courses. Mostly this was the team-taught undergraduate health course PSY255 and numerous independent and directed readings courses at both the graduate and undergraduate level.

Guest Lectures: 2 faculty (Stein, Wood) and 2 students (Amoyal, Youssef) reported a total of 9 guest lectures.

Student Proposals & Defenses: 8 area faculty served as major professors and committee members on MA & PhD proposals & defenses (Morokoff, Paiva, Prochaska, Redding, Robbins, Rossi, Stein, Wood).
