

**ANNUAL REPORT
HONORS PROGRAM AND VISITING SCHOLARS COMMITTEE
2010-2011**

The Honors Colloquium, *RACE*, was our major public offering last year. This series explored key issues of race, showing how race shapes everyday experiences, public policies and opportunities for individual achievement. The Colloquium was coordinated by Professors Lynne Derbyshire, College of Arts and Sciences; Rae Ferguson, College of Arts and Sciences; Gail Faris, Women's Center and Student Life; Kyle Kusz, College of Human Science and Services; Kendall Moore, College of Arts and Sciences; Ian Reyes, College of Arts and Sciences with the assistance of Deborah Gardiner of the Honors program. Presenters included well-known historians, authors, and political figures. Cory Booker, mayor of Newark New Jersey, was a speaker and was subsequently invited to be the 2011 URI commencement speaker. The colloquium closed with a performance "*Sound Unbound*" presented by Paul D. Miller, Professor of Music Mediated Art, The European Graduate School.

Our spring Colloquium was *Classroom without Borders*. Gail Faris, Assistant Director of the Women's Center and Student Life, taught a class on poverty and housing featuring a number of URI based experts. The students then spent spring break working on a Habitat for Humanity project in Birmingham Alabama, supervised by Gail. This experience was so successful in building community among the students that we have decided to repeat it in spring 2011. Two students who had previously taken this colloquium, Elise Glidden and Ryan Kilpatrick, led a smaller group on a Habitat project to Exmore Virginia. These students were trained in leadership the previous semester and led a successful trip. We hope to repeat this experience.

The annual Honors Undergraduate Research Conference was held in Lippitt Hall on May 5, 2011. Sixty-six students presented their projects on twenty-five different panels. This included projects from all the undergraduate degree granting colleges, offering an impressive array of departments and programs. The titles of the projects along with the names of the faculty sponsors are available as Appendix B to this report. Associate Honors Director Carolyn Hames organized the conference with the assistance of Program Coordinator, Deborah Gardiner.

The Honors Program continued to offer a wide range of stimulating Honors courses, promote scholarship opportunities, sponsor undergraduate research projects, and provide financial support for noted scholars to come to URI for special presentations to students, faculty, and the public. A brief informational report describing specific activities of the Committee for 2010-2011 follows.

A. Eligibility Standards for 2010-2011

The standards of eligibility for students to participate in Honors Program course work were changed for both incoming and continuing students. All freshmen graduating in the top 10% of their high school class or receiving a Centennial scholarship were invited to take Honors courses. Beginning with the class of 2013, sophomores, juniors, and seniors must have earned a 3.3 GPA to remain eligible (up from 3.2). Under special circumstances, these requirements may be modified with permission of the Director.

Sophomore students with at least two honors courses and 3.3 or better GPA were offered early registration this semester. This is the second year of a pilot program designed to meet one of the criteria of a "fully developed honors program" according to the standards of the National Collegiate Honors Council. To qualify these students must meet with an Honors advisor and commit to a declaration of intent to complete the honors program. We thank Associate Provost Dean Libutti for his help with this experiment initiative and look forward to making this a permanent feature of the program.

Many high performing students are insufficiently aware of the opportunities that exist in Honors. The Honors Advising Liaison program is intended to link students with faculty members in their departments/colleges who could help them integrate honors courses into their program requirements and encourage them along the way. We are grateful to these 34 faculty members for making this possible, and will continue to expand this network. This year we took new steps to reach 2nd semester freshmen who have performed exceptionally well and to continue our cooperation with University College in providing information relevant to decision making for first and second year students. Associate Director Walter von Reinhart continues in his role as advisor to freshmen and sophomore honors students and is the primary Honors contact for University College and the Admission office.

B. Courses and Enrollment

During the Fall, 2010 semester, the Program offered thirty Honors courses in addition to Senior Honors Projects, Honors Directed Study and Administrative Internships: twenty-one 100-level courses, the 200-level Colloquium, six 300-level tutorials, and two 400-level Senior Seminars.

In the Spring, 2010 semester we offered twenty-four Honors courses in addition to Senior Honors Projects, Administrative Internships and Honors Directed Study: twelve 100-level courses, the 200-level Colloquium, six 300-level tutorials, and five 400-level Senior Seminars.

Student enrollment in Honors classes was 527 during the Fall, 2010 semester and 396 students during the Spring, 2011 semester. These figures are based on post-drop mid-semester rosters. For Fall, 2011, thirty-seven Honors courses in addition to Senior Projects, Administrative Internships and Honors Directed Study are offered.

C. Faculty

The Honors faculty is drawn from seven of the University's colleges. See Appendix A for a list of those who taught Honors courses in 2009-2010.

Over the past several years we have consciously attempted to increase the disciplinary diversity of our course offerings while retaining the liberal arts core of the Honors program. We intend the Honors Program to be the premier inter-disciplinary teaching site on campus.

New courses in 2010-2011 included:

The URI Honors Colloquium has grown into a statewide and nationally recognized forum for contemporary issues demanding scholarly attention and debate. The URI Department of Communications and Marketing has succeeded in achieving public visibility and widespread coverage for the Colloquium. 2010-2011 was the second year that the Colloquium was web-streamed live on the URI homepage. This will continue, as will archiving of most public lectures for more widespread use. The Colloquium also is wonderfully supported by the URI Publications Office, which produces the copy and art for the posters, flyers, and brochures.

I thank the Fall 2010 Colloquium Coordinators Lynne Derbyshire, Gail Faris, Rae Ferguson, Kyle Kusz, Kendall Moore, Ian Reyes for their time and creativity in conducting such an outstanding series of events and teaching the co-related Honors Colloquium class for 51 honors students. Deborah Gardiner managed the logistical and business aspects of the Colloquium with patience and efficiency.

The Fall 2011 Honors Colloquium, *Are You Ready for the Future?* kicked off on September 13, under the direction of Professor Peter Cornillon, Graduate School of Oceanography; Assistant Professor Chris Roman, Graduate School of Oceanography; Judith Swift, Director of the Coastal Institute and Professor of Communication Studies. Presenters included Inventor and futurist Ray Kurzweil; Director of the Wake Forest Institute for Regenerative Medicine and urologist Anthony Atala; and URI professor and nanotechnologist Jason Dwyer.

For Spring, 2012, we are offering two Honors Colloquia: *Classroom without Borders*, directed by Rob Widell, Assistant Professor of History and *Prison in the Arts, the Arts in Prison*, directed by Karen De Bruin, Assistant Professor of Languages.

The Honors Program and Visiting Scholars Committee has selected for the Fall, 2012 Honors Colloquium: "Healthcare Change? Health, Politics and Money" to be co-coordinated by Clinical Associate Professor Jef Bratberg, URI College of Pharmacy; Clinical Assistant Professor Mary Cloud, URI College of Nursing; Carnegie Professor Roger Lebrun, URI College of Environment and Life Sciences; and Adjunct Assistant Professor Shahla Yekta, URI College of Nursing. This will be the 50th URI Honors Colloquium. We are working with various groups on campus to use this opportunity to promote the Honors Program and URI more generally.

A call for proposals for Fall 2013 was distributed to the campus community in October.

F. Awards and Endowment

The Honors Colloquium has two endowed lectures thanks to the help of Tom Zorabedian and Dean Winnie Brownell. We hope to work closely with new Foundation President Michael J. Smith and his staff in development centered on the 50th Honors Colloquium as well as more general support for the Honors Program.

G. Visiting Scholars

We supported several faculty proposals to bring visiting scholars to campus. We also worked with Vice Provost Laura Beauvais to award grants for international distinguished visiting scholars. Four scholars visited the campus for weeklong visits over the course of the semester. We will continue to develop this program that we hope will contribute to the university's expanding global presence.

H. Senior Honors Projects and Undergraduate Research

Senior Honors Projects were presented at the eight annual Honors Undergraduate Research Day on May 5, 2011. The student conference scheduled concurrent sessions throughout the day for humanities, social science, natural science, and professional college projects in Lippitt Hall. Each senior completing a project also contributed an abstract to a booklet of abstracts available in the Honors Center in Lippitt Hall. Presenters and titles are listed in Appendix B along with faculty sponsors. Associate Director Carolyn Hames serves as the major advisor to students completing the Honors program and is the main organizer of the annual research conference.

I want to express sincere appreciation to these faculty sponsors who devote their time to mentoring the senior honors students. Their contribution is particularly remarkable in that thirty-seven of these faculty members were not teaching an honors course in 2010-2011. Together with the forty-eight honors faculty teaching HPR courses, this brings the total number of faculty participating in the Honors Program during 2010-2011 to eighty-five (85).

We continue to assist Karen Markin of the Division of Research and Economic Development on the Undergraduate Research Awards. This program, generously funded by Vice President Peter Alfonso and Provost Donald DeHayes, provides support for undergraduate research across the University, whether students are in Honors or not. I also wish to thank Provost DeHayes for his continued commitment to supporting student research in the Honors Program.

I. Spring Honors Celebration and Awards Ceremony

The Spring Honors Celebration and Awards ceremony was held on May 5, 2011 in Lippitt Hall.

M. Pre-Health

Assistant Honors Director Kathleen Maher chairs the Health Professions Advisory Committee. She has quickly built synergy between pre-Health and Honors. To further encourage pre-Med students to become involved in Honors we are offering honors sections of organic chemistry and biochemistry this year for the first time. Kathleen has developed a system of peer mentoring and group advising sessions. We hope that these new offerings will allow our pre-med students to achieve even greater success.

Along with these successes have come significant problems due to understaffing. This summer we were able to hire Brian Clinton in a shared position with the College of the Environment and Life Sciences to advise and teach in our pre-health program.

N. Honors Housing

Housing is available to upper class students on the 4th floor of the Garrahy apartments. There is generally significant excess demand for the 44 beds on that floor and we hope to expand Honors Housing opportunities.

O. Undergraduate Teaching Experience in Honors

We are experimenting with giving senior honors students experience as undergraduate teachers. In addition to opportunities as teaching assistants, we invited students to propose freshmen seminars that they will lead under the guidance of faculty mentors. Brian Stack is leading the first such course, LGBTQ History, this semester. This experimental program is modeled after similar programs at URI and elsewhere. We have learned quite a bit over the past year and hope to continue this opportunity in future semesters.
