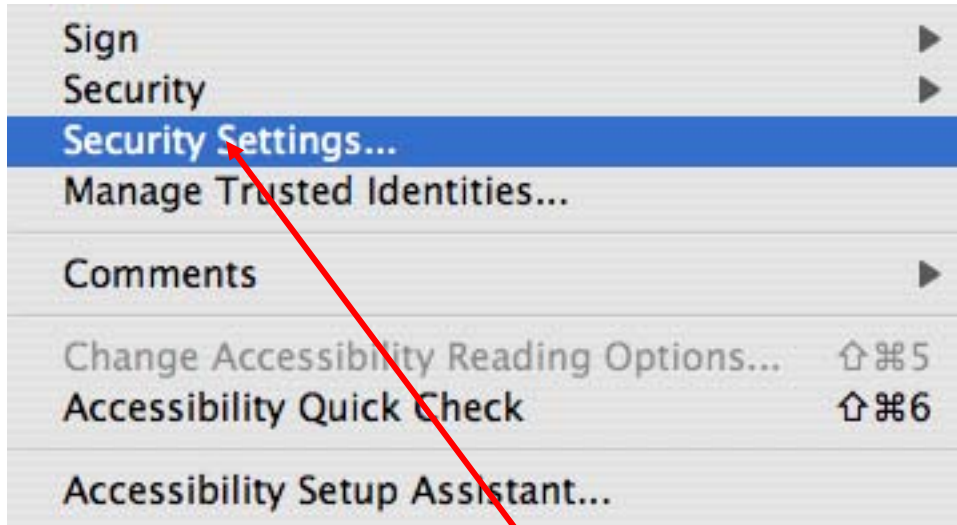
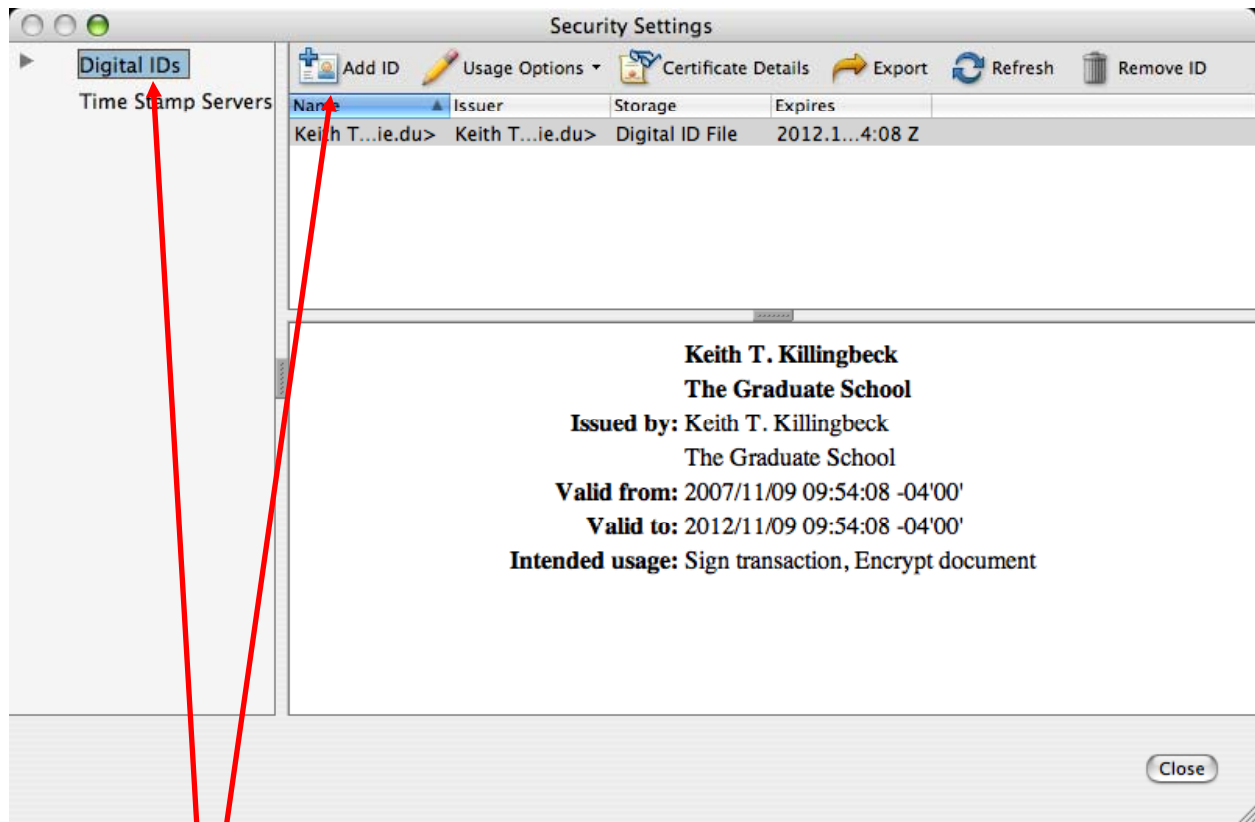


Creating a Digital Signature in Adobe Reader 8.0 (Mac)



1. In Adobe Reader select Document > Security Setting



2. Under "Digital IDs"
3. Click "Add ID"

Add Digital ID

Add or create a digital ID to sign and encrypt documents. The certificate that comes with your digital ID is sent to others so that they can verify your signature.

- Browse for an existing digital ID file
- Configure a roaming ID for use on this computer
- Create a self-signed digital ID for use with Acrobat
- Look for newly inserted hardware tokens

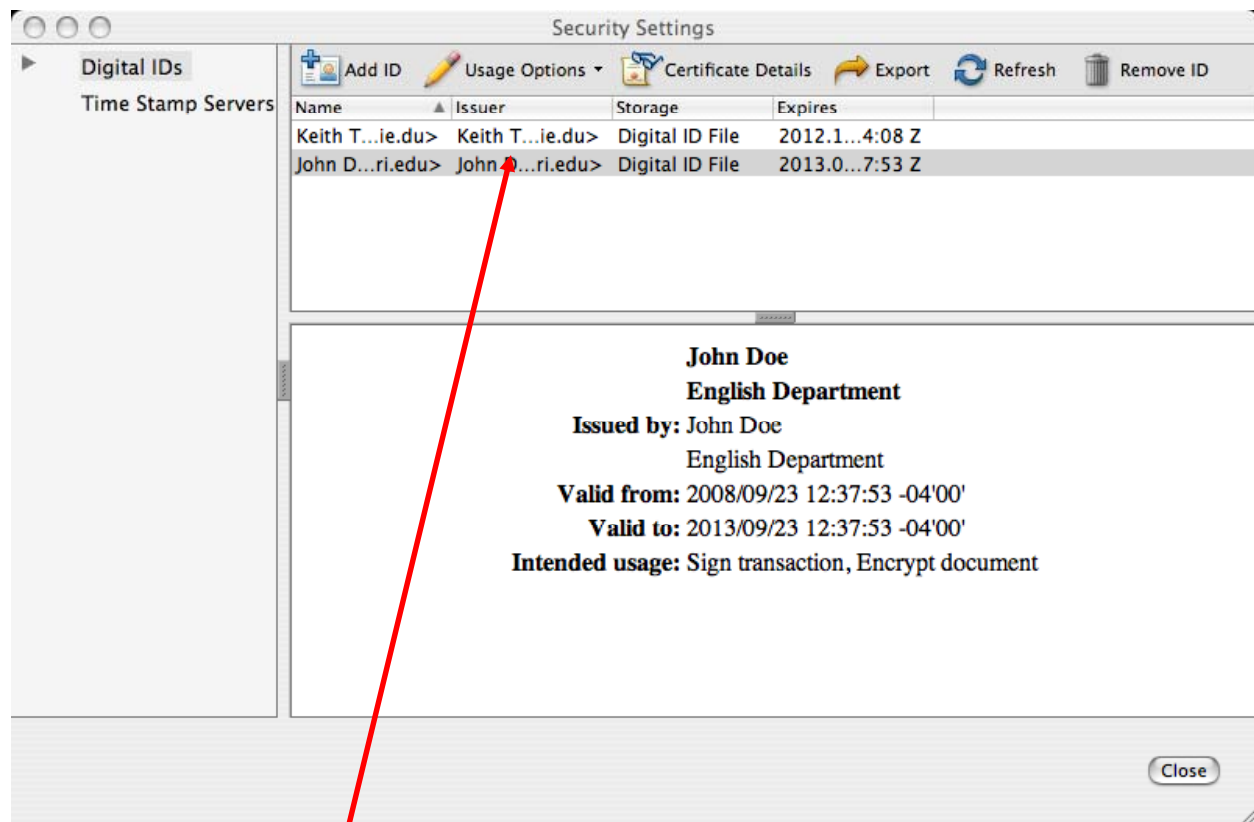

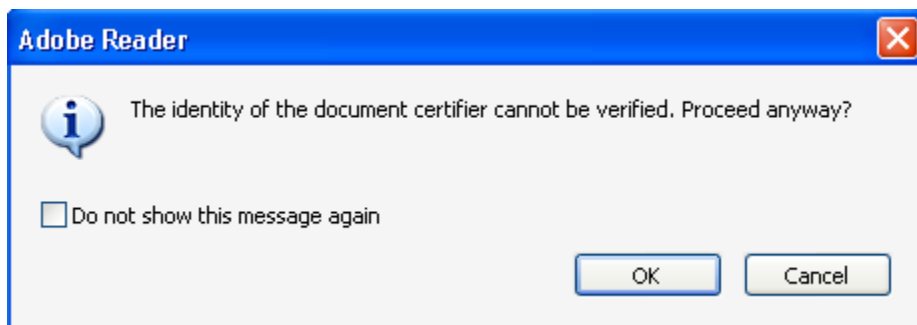

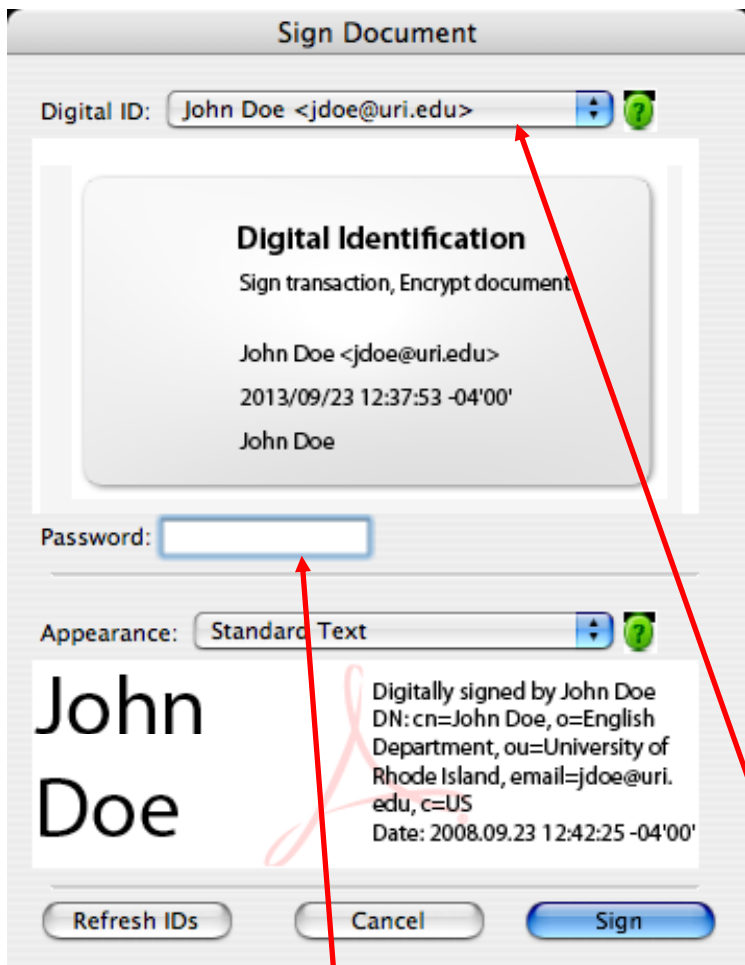
6. Click "Browse" and select a location to store your digital file.

8. Click "Finish"



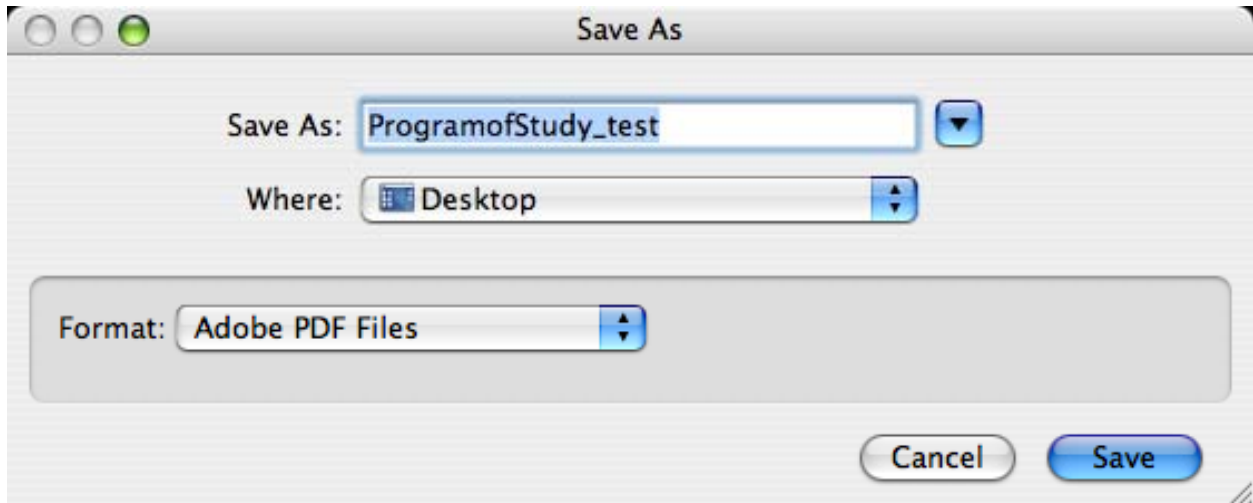
Your signature will now appear under "Digital IDs" and can be used to sign documents.

6. Click "Sign".

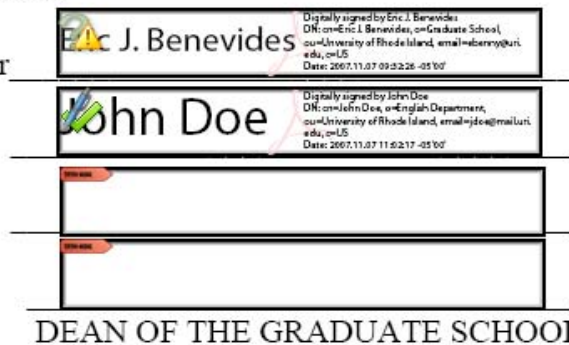


7. Save the document.
