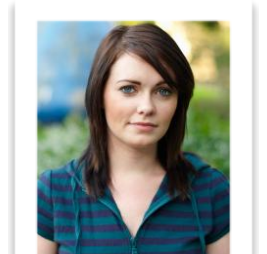




## Center for Sexual Health

**James F. Campbell, PhD** is a licensed psychologist and an AASECT (American Association of Sex Educators, Counselors, and Therapists) certified sex therapist and a certified sex therapy supervisor. He has practiced sex therapy in independent practice and at the University of Rhode Island Counseling Center, where he was director for twelve years. Dr. Campbell teaches human sexuality at URI, where he is on the graduate faculty, and also conducts individual and group supervision for clinicians seeking certification for sex therapy. He is Vice-President at Psychological Centers and is President of the Rhode Island Psychological Association.

**Tiffani S. Kisler , PhD**, is an Assistant Professor of Marriage and Family Therapy at the University of Rhode Island. Dr. Kisler teaches courses in Theories of Marriage and Family Therapy, Human Sexuality, Sex Therapy, Assessment in Family Therapy, and Marriage and Family Relationships for the Marriage and Family Therapy graduate program. She has published and presented at national and international conferences on her clinical and research specialties, which include sexual functioning, sexual aggression, relational and sexual satisfaction, sex therapy techniques, and marriage and family therapy training.

The Center for Sexual Health provides clinical services to individuals and couples coping with sexual and relationship problems.

The Center also offers professional continuing education, clinical supervision, consultation to other providers, and other training opportunities to promote the delivery of high quality, evidence-based sex and relational therapy services.

At the Center we believe that sexuality is a central part of human identity and an integral part of relationships, meaning, and life satisfaction. Clinicians at the Center take an affirming, welcoming approach with clients. Concerns are addressed in a patient, respectful, private, and supportive environment. Since some sexual problems have a physical or medical basis, the Center maintains a network of collaborating providers from various medical and behavioral specialties, including gynecologists, endocrinologists, and physical therapists, to provide comprehensive assessment and treatment.

Sexual difficulties may be longstanding or may begin in response to certain life events such as depression, medication use, change in a relationship, or aging. Some life events such as job stress, childbirth, relocation, or trauma can also cause changes in sexual functioning. An individual's history and experiences with sex, or an evolving sense of sexual identity or preference, may also influence sexual adjustment and styles of expression.

### **Possible Concerns**

- Absent or low sexual desire
- Desire discrepancy in relationships
- Difficulty achieving orgasm
- Atypical sexual behavior
- Infertility
- Painful intercourse
- Sexual arousal difficulties
- Rapid or delayed ejaculation
- Sexual and gender identity
- Sexual trauma and abuse
- Relationship difficulties
- Impact of health problems or aging on sexuality
