Free Electives (3 credits):

With their Free Electives, students are encouraged to take any classes that pique their interests beyond those required for their major. Students might also consider taking liberal arts oriented classes that facilitate their development of a broader base of knowledge that extends beyond their specialization. Or, students might choose to use these Free Electives to further enhance their education in becoming a health/fitness or to earn a Minor in another field. Finally, students might continue taking classes toward Health Certification and/or Adapted Endorsement.

****PETE students may opt to take more that 128 credits to earn both health certification and adapted endorsement before graduation.

Other Key Issues Students Need to Know related to Advising and Graduation:

- To transfer from University College to Kinesiology, students must earn at least 24 credits, hold a GPA of at least 2.0, pass BIO 101, and earn at least a C in BIO 121. (So BIO 101 & BIO 121 should be taken within a student's first 3 semesters).
- Deadlines for submitting "Intent to Graduate Form" with Dean's Office to make students eligible for graduation: October 15th for May graduation, March 15th for August graduation, April 15th for December graduation.

The following are the RI state requirements as of fall, 2005. These are subject to change at any time during your program:

- Students must take pass all 3 sections of the Praxis I: PPST test or have an SAT score of 1100 to be eligible to apply for the Physical Education Teacher Education program.
- Students in the Physical Education Teacher Education program must take and pass the Praxis II: PLT tests and the P-12 Content Knowledge test to be eligible to student teach.
